

Early detection of breast and cervical cancer can save your life.

Did you know?

- More than 75% of breast and cervical cancers occur in women over age 50. A woman's risk of getting cancer increases with age.
- In Kansas each year, about 370 women die of breast cancer and about 30 die from cervical cancer.
- Regular mammograms among women age 50-69 can reduce deaths by 30%.
- In the past 40 years, the number of cervical cancer cases and deaths have greatly decreased. This is largely due to women getting regular Pap tests that can find cervical pre-cancer before it turns into cancer.
- Routine screening and prompt treatment can reduce illness and deaths from breast and cervical cancer.

Are you at risk?

- 1 out of every 8 women will develop breast cancer during her life.
- Women with a mother or sister who had breast cancer have a higher risk of breast cancer.
- 1,900 Kansas women are diagnosed with breast cancer each year.
- 90 Kansas women are diagnosed with cervical cancer each year.



FREE Mammograms and Pap Tests



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Early Detection Works Eligibility

This program pays for breast and cervical cancer screenings for Kansas women who:

- **Are 40 to 64 years old.** Women under 40 with breast or cervical health concerns should call toll-free 1-877-277-1368 to find out what resources are available.
- **Do not have health insurance.**
- **Have this much family income or less:**

Free Breast Cancer Screening



- Clinical breast exams performed by a physician or nurse
- Mammograms for women

Free Cervical Cancer Screening



- Pap tests for women 40 to 64 years old as recommended by doctor and EDW guidelines*

**National cervical cancer screening guidelines were updated in 2012. Most women do not need a Pap test every year. Talk with your health care provider about when you need a Pap test.*

Help if You Have Insurance or Do Not Qualify

Most health insurance, Medicaid and Medicare pay for breast and cervical cancer screening. If you do not have health insurance, visit www.healthcare.gov or call 1-800-318-2596 to find out if you qualify for health insurance through the health insurance marketplace.

How to Enroll

Call the number on the back of this brochure for more information. If you qualify for this program, you will be given an enrollment number and referred to a health care provider. You may also call toll-free 1-877-277-1368 or visit www.kdheks.gov/edw to learn more about the program.

What if Something is Found?

If one of your screening tests shows a problem, Early Detection Works pays for specific follow-up tests to find out if you have cancer or a pre-cancerous condition. The health care provider will arrange follow-up appointments with you.

If You Need Treatment

Women who are Kansas residents and who are diagnosed with cancer through this program are eligible for referral to KanCare (Kansas Medicaid). Other treatment options may be available for women not eligible for KanCare. Call the number on the back of this brochure for more information.
