Chris Tuck, RN, MS, was honored as the Kansas School Nurse of the Year by her school district and the Kansas School Nurse Organization (KSNO) in July at the Kansas School Nurse Conference in Wichita. Chris was nominated by her district superintendent and administrators at Seaman USD 345, Topeka, for her professionalism, dedication, compassion and leadership displayed in her work with students, student families and school staff on a daily basis. More than 400 school nurses, Chris's district superintendent and her family were present when she accepted the award. Tuck credits her success in school nursing to the mentoring of her colleagues in nursing, membership in professional organizations, knowledge gained from educators and students in the Seaman school district, and the support of her family.

Chris has 30 years of experience in nursing. Fourteen years of nursing were spent in pediatrics in hospital and clinic settings, 16 years in school nursing; 13 years at Seaman USD #345 and three years at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment as the Child and School Nurse Consultant. In addition to serving as the school nurse for Seaman High School, Chris is the director of

health services for the Seaman school district. Tuck serves as the membership chair for KSNO, serves on various committees advocating for the health of children, active with the American Lung Association (Awarded "Lung Health Champion - 2005" for her outstanding leadership to prevent lung disease and promote lung health, "Open Airways" National American Lung Association Award 1998), and recently accepted an adjunct professor position with Friends University.

HEALTH CENTER HONORED

BY JOHNSON & JOHNSON AND UCLA'S ANDERSON SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

Lyon County Health Department/Flint Hills Community Health Center, in Emporia, and Lougene Marsh, executive director, are the 2006 recipients of the Johnson & Johnson Community Healthcare Improvement Project (CHIP) Award. Her efforts have facilitated a number of similar programs in the area. In receiving her CHIP award Marsh states, "My participation in the program enriched my professional development, which allowed me to make a positive impact not only in the lives of the patients of Flint Hills Community Health Center, but also in the lives of the patients of community health centers and privately funded primary care clinics across Kansas."

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING STORY

In 1977, David Olds, Ph.D., began developing a nurse home-visitation model designed to help low-income, first-time mothers take better care of themselves and their babies. Nearly 30 years later, with support from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and others, "Olds Model" has bloomed into the Nurse-Family Partnership, a nonprofit organization serving more than 20,000 mothers in 20 states. Today, despite decades of evidence confirming the efficacy of the program, as well as recognition at the highest levels, Olds continues to refine his model, still dedicated to helping mothers provide the many things their children need.

There were certain elements about the home visitation program that Olds knew had to be present to ensure a positive impact. Those elements included:



- ✓ The program had to work with first-time parents.
- ✓ The program had to be conducted in the home.
- ✓ The program would rely on nurses as in-home visitors.
- ✓ The visits would begin during pregnancy.
- ✓ The program would have three major goals:
 - To improve pregnancy outcomes by improving women's prenatal health.
 - To improve child health and development by reducing the amount of dysfunctional care giving for infants.
 - To improve the mother's life course by helping her develop a vision for her future, plan future pregnancies, stay in school and find employment.

New data from a 15-year follow up of the Olds Model in Elmira, NY, shows positive effects on nurse-visited families more than a dozen years after the visits were concluded. Some of the metrics of success (from pregnancy through child age 15) include:

- ❑ 56 percent fewer doctor and hospital visits due to childhood injuries through child age 2.
- ❑ 25 percent reduction in cigarette smoking by mothers during pregnancy.
- ❑ 48 percent less incidence of child abuse and neglect through child age 15.
- ❑ 69 percent fewer convictions of nurse-visited children at age 15.
- ❑ 83 percent increase in workforce participation by low-income, unmarried mothers by the time their child is 4 years old.

Even now, with a 15-year longitudinal study further confirming the success of the Olds Model, David still speaks modestly about the work that has consumed the better part of his life.

NEW DENTAL CLINIC OPENS

On July 17 after two years of planning, Healthy Options for Kansas Communities opened a new community dental clinic. The three-chair clinic is located in Planeview.

Healthy Options for Planeview (HOP) is a community-campus educational and outreach program affiliated with the Department of Physician Assistant at Wichita State University. The Planeview dental clinic offers cleanings, x-rays and primary care dentistry such as fillings and extractions. Clinic hours are 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., Mon., Tues., Wed., and Fri. The clinic accepts Medicaid, HealthWave and private insurance. Interpreters are on site during all clinic visits.

KANSAS LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT WORKFORCE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The Kansas Local Health Department Workforce Needs Assessment was completed in 2005 in cooperation with the Heartland Centers for Public Health and Community Capacity Development at the Saint Louis University School of Public Health. The results of that report are now available.

The Purpose: to assess *perceived* training needs and interests among the Kansas local public health workforce.



The Goals:

- ✚ Use public health competencies as a framework
- ✚ Identify personal ability and importance to job
- ✚ Assess barriers and facilitators to training
- ✚ Determine best methods for delivery of training

There was a 76 percent response rate to the survey. A training needs score was calculated by participants rating their personal ability in each public health competency (rating 1 – 4) and subtracting the importance to their job (rating 1 – 4). A negative score indicated a need for training.

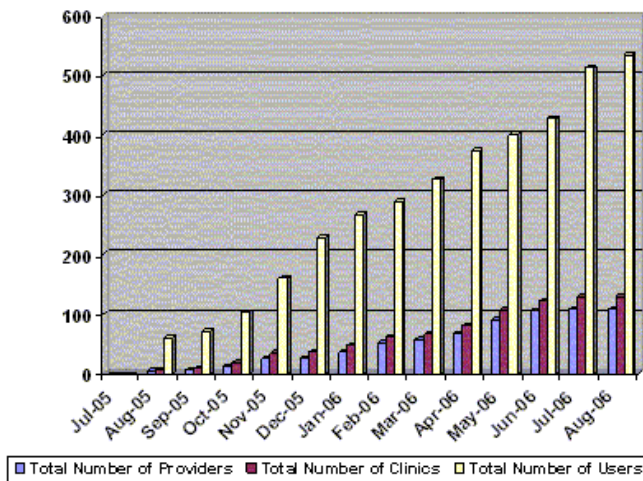

THE KANSAS IMMUNIZATION REGISTRY, KSWEBIZ, IS ON A ROLL!

Total Providers, Clinics and Users: July 2005 - August 2006



The system has been deployed to 85 providers. There are now 535 end-users on KSWebIZ, which is currently maintaining information on 650,677 patients with a total of 2,840,699 vaccinations. Forty-one local health departments and 44 private providers are online and accessing KSWebIZ directly.

The remaining local health departments and some private doctors will interface with the registry and exchange immunization information "behind the scenes." These providers can continue to use their internal clinic management systems (i.e. QS and PHClinic) for public health departments and many private provider systems as well. Updated data will be sent from these systems to the registry and vice versa. This process is the second phase of the Kansas immunization registry project whereby providers continue to use their respective systems to share

immunization data. Having this data exchange in place, results in building immunization records that are the up-to-date, complete and eliminates the need for data entry into two separate systems.

The registry team met with representative school nurses at the Kansas School Nurse Conference in July. We have begun to capture input from these end-users which will be used to design and implement the system customizations required by school nurses. We have designated 10 of these users to comprise an advisory committee. Over the coming months we will be working with this committee to develop the system changes so that school nurses will have the ability to look up student immunization status as they enroll for each school year and provide the registry with valuable legacy data.

We have been working with health plans to design a two-way interface that will allow health plans to request immunization information on a list of their *specific health plan patients* and will also send updated information back to the registry on these identified individuals. It is anticipated that this interface will be completed by the end of the first quarter of 2007.

We are extremely excited about the progress that has been made and will keep you updated monthly in this newsletter. Thanks to all who have supported this effort!

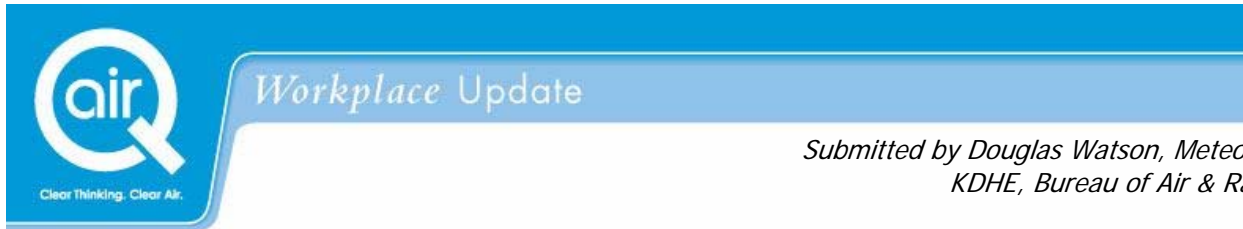

PANDEMIC PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE: AN EDUCATIONAL TOOLKIT

MEDICAL TECHNOLOGIST



The Johnson County Kansas Public Health Department is seeking a medical technologist on a full-time basis. The medical technologist assures standardization in all tests performed onsite; provides client education of laboratory tests and instructions; provides day-to-day supervision of all tests performed by nursing staff; reports abnormal test results to the appropriate person; obtains blood, urine and other samples from clients; calibrates laboratory equipment; runs all controls on a daily basis; completes daily decontamination of work area; maintains quality control and quality assurance in laboratory; and participates in Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments (CLIA) approved National Proficiency Test Program.

Requires a bachelor's of science degree in biology, chemistry or physical science. The successful candidate must possess one to two years of experience in high complexity testing for manual hematology. One year internship at an accredited hospital; medical technologist certificate; technical skill phlebotomy training and experience is also required. Requires a valid driver's license and a medical technologist license certification. Exposure to fumes and/or chemicals; travel required 10 percent of the time between two clinics. 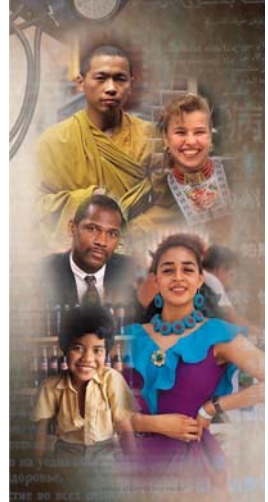

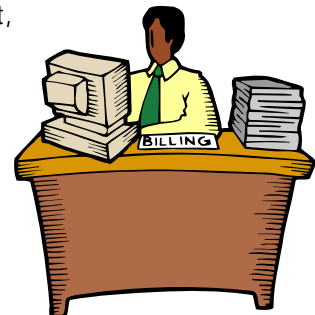
