2. **KS Public Health Leadership Institute**  
<http://www.waldcenter.org/kphli/about.html> The Kansas Public Health Leadership Institute is an advanced program for public health professionals and partners which promotes public health leadership competencies and crisis leadership competencies. Scholars who enroll in the Institute complete a year-long course of study and on-site activities, along with a capstone project which focuses on a current issue they face in their leadership roles.
3. **“Learning with Lilly” CD** (Introduction to Public Health Nursing) available at: <http://www.heartlandcenters.slu.edu/programs> Look under “products” This CD-ROM is an interactive course and resource tool for Public Health Nurses designed especially for those nurses who are new to Public Health. Emphasis is placed on the Principles of Population Based Public Health Nursing and the integrative systems of the local, state, and national health departments. A Kansas version is in progress.
4. **Annual KPHA Conference**, <http://www.kpha.us/> Watch for various topics covering multiple public health competencies. This conference is held in the Fall of each year.

These tutorials focus on health information and computer literacy skills and are designed not only to support academic public health informatics programs and public health outreach training initiatives but also to help general audiences in finding, evaluating, and using reliable health information on the Internet. The tutorials are competency-based and feature learning objectives, key concepts, exercises, and case studies. Information tutorials include: Evidence Based Public Health; Finding Health Statistics Online; Searching the Internet; Searching the Public Health Literature; Staying Informed; and Health Education Resources. Software tutorials include basic: PowerPoint; Access; and Excel.
